

# Community Gateway Features

In Furry Creek, consistent with community input, new gateways could be located just north of the southbound intersection and just south of the northbound intersection. These locations would define the entry, from both directions, into the Furry Creek community, in a similar manner to other communities on the corridor, but with distinctive elements unique to Furry Creek to set it apart.

The southernmost sign (the big rock sign) will have to be temporarily relocated to accommodate a temporary third lane of traffic planned in the vicinity of Porteau Bluffs during the Olympic period. This rock sign could be relocated at or near its present location at the conclusion of the Olympic period.

**Elements of Continuity** are consistent features that identify the Sea-to-Sky Highway corridor as a system from West Vancouver to Whistler.

**Elements of Distinction** are features developed in consultation with each community at the detailed design phase, representing each community as a unique place and destination.

## Community Links

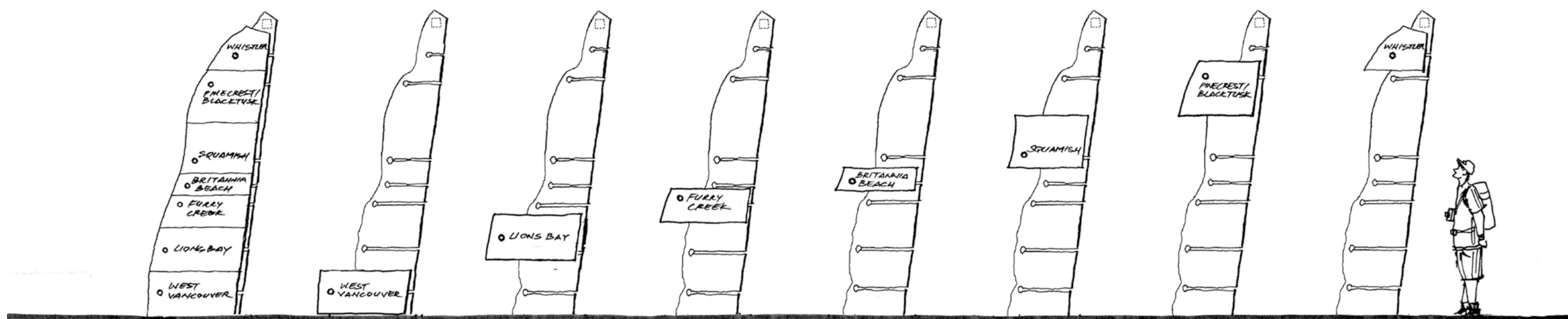
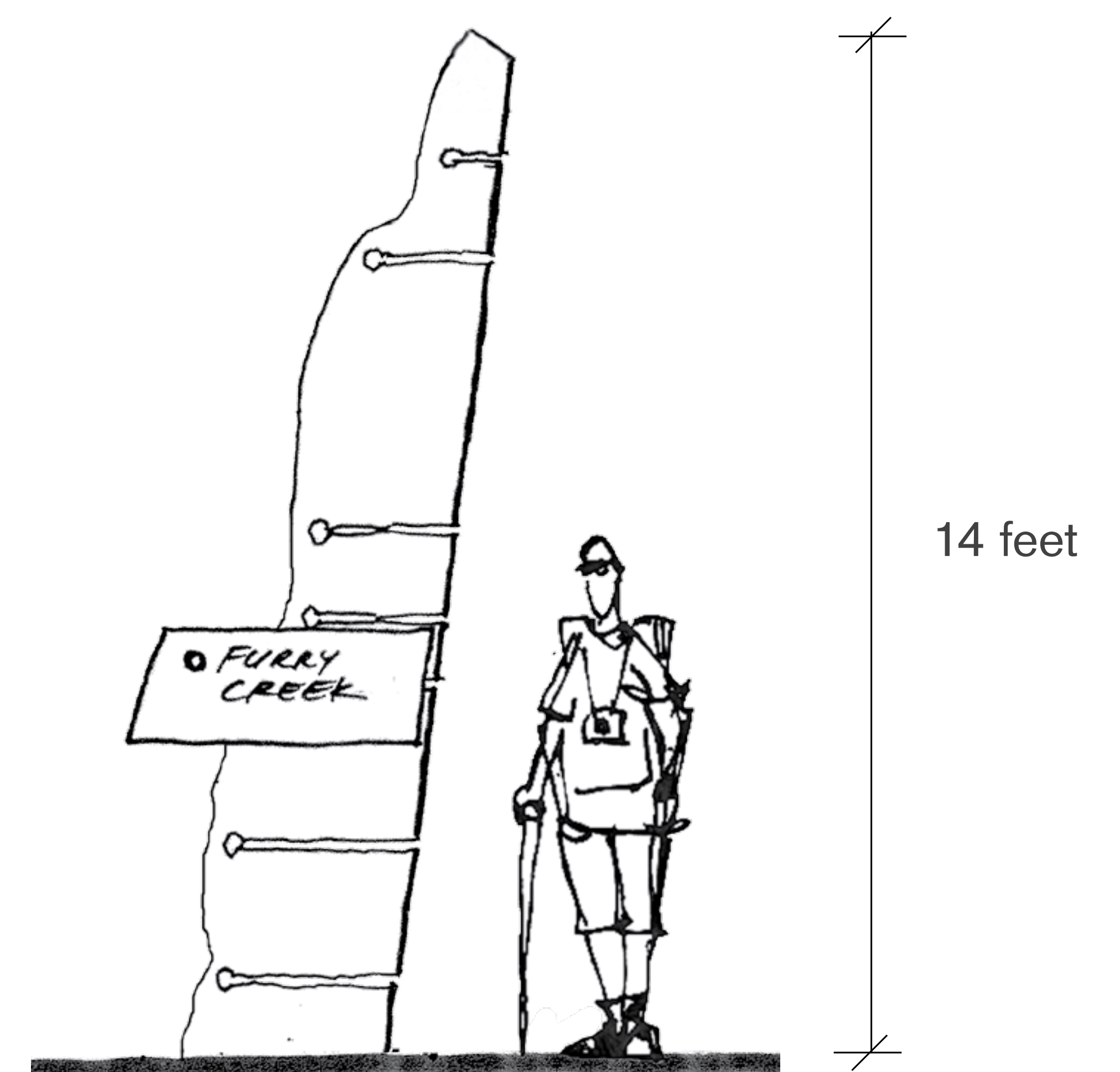
### Elements of Continuity

- vertical face (wood or metal) with carved edge representing the curve of the Sea-to-Sky Highway
- locations of corridor communities along the highway marked with a line

### Elements of Distinction

- unique glass-like, metal or wooden coloured sleeve featuring the name of the community
- emphasizes the name of the community being entered
- considers input from the community

**The Community Links option** shows the location of each community while highlighting the idea of being linked in a network of corridor communities. It is approximately 14 feet high and could be illuminated from within or by spotlight.



## Community Rings

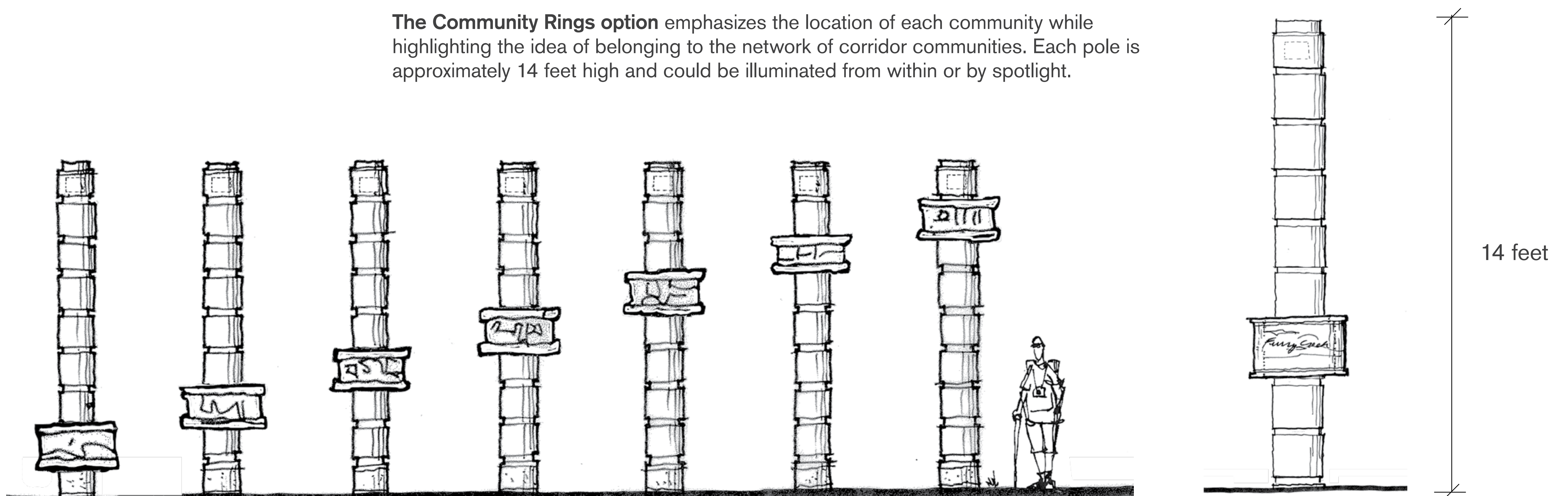
### Elements of Continuity

- vertical pole (wood or metal)

### Elements of Distinction

- unique glass-like, metal or wooden coloured band featuring the name of the community
- emphasizes name of community being entered
- considers input from the community

**The Community Rings option** emphasizes the location of each community while highlighting the idea of belonging to the network of corridor communities. Each pole is approximately 14 feet high and could be illuminated from within or by spotlight.



## Community Blades

### Elements of Continuity

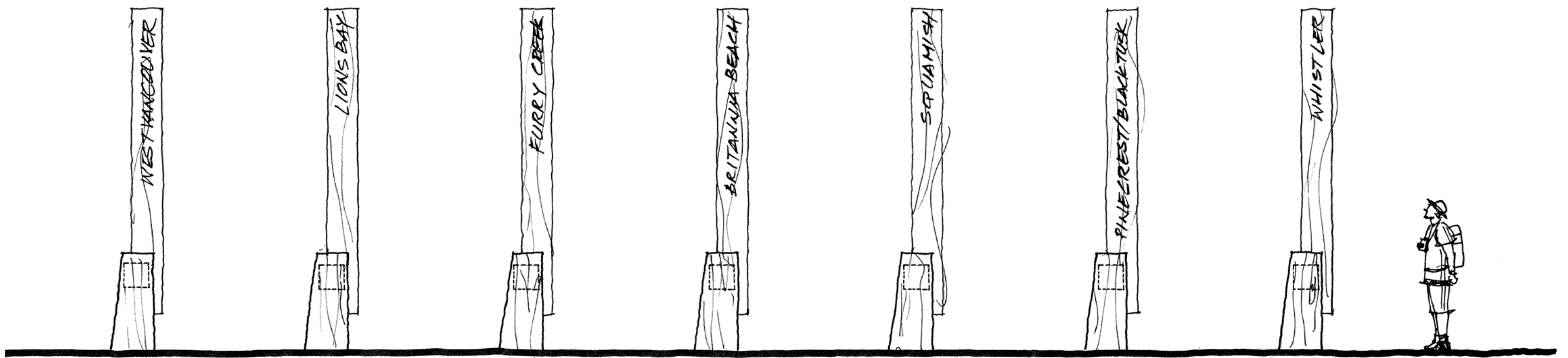
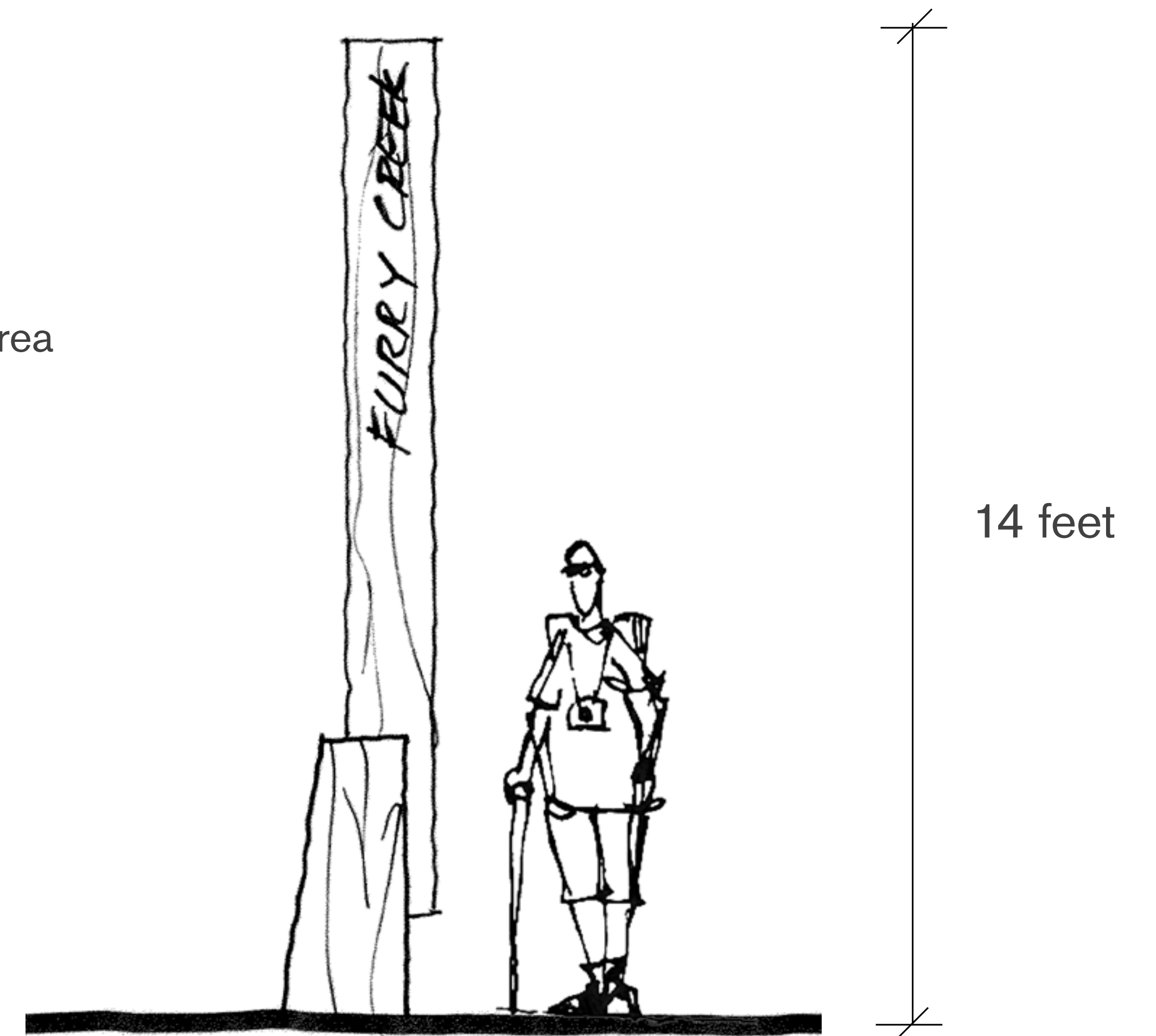
- base fabricated from solid wood beam

### Elements of Distinction

- metal or wooden blade that fits into wood base
- considers input from the community

### The Community Blade option

- integrates with the surrounding environment and history of area
- features a simple, contemporary geometric form
- is adaptable to other signage uses of different scales
- approximately 14 feet high
- could be illuminated



## Community Rocks

### Option A

#### Elements of Continuity

- boulder or rock; real or "faux"

#### Elements of Distinction

- considers input from the community

### Option B

#### Elements of Continuity

- boulder or rock used as consistent base

#### Elements of Distinction

- sculpture or sign with community name and symbol attached to base designed in consultation with community

### In Option A and B

- rock is approximately 8 feet high
- could be illuminated
